



New England has been ravaged with opioid addiction; heroin use, abuse and dependence; and accidental overdose deaths. In response to this epidemic, States have enacted legislation (e.g., 911 Good Samaritan laws) and educated first responders, medical providers, law enforcement personnel, fire department staff, treatment providers and the general public on the use and administration of naloxone (narcant), an overdose reversal drug that can prevent death from an opioid-induced overdose. However, despite public awareness campaigns, there is still work to be done to inform communities about the use, availability, and safety of naloxone. This program seeks to educate attendees about the benefits of naloxone distribution as well as to discuss opioid overdose prevention.
